1	a) Historical Archaeology – The attempt is to help students learn to analyze archaeological data by studying excavation report from early historic settlements. b) History of the Caste system – Under the rubric of the caste system researchers are trained to understand the linkages between religion, society and economy.	08 Hours
2	a) Religion and Society in Early India – It is an attempt to situation religion within the larger social discourse of politics and economics. It will focus on Buddhism and the religion of the Puranas.	07 Hours
3	a) Literature and Society – This topic is meant to help students learn methods of analyzing texts to obtain historical information. b) The state in Early India – This topic intends to interrogate issues related to the nature of state in early India. It will cover themes like the nature of the Mauryan state. The debate on feudalism will be an important part of the study.	08 Hours
